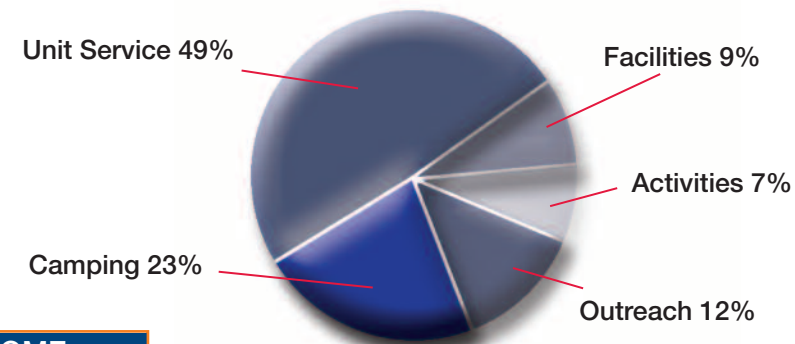
- 60%** of our units qualified as Journey to Excellence in 2011.
