PROGRAM STRUCTURE





Kindergartners work toward the Lion rank. The Lion rank is earned by completing five adventures. Lions introduce Scouts and their adult partners to the excitement of Cub Scouting. Although participation with an adult partner is required for all Lion activities, recognition items are for the Scouts only.

Bobcat

All Scouts first thru fifth grade, regardless of age, must first earn the Bobcat badge by learning the Scout Law, Scout Oath, handshake, salute, sign and motto. After receiving the Bobcat badge, Scouts work on requirements based on their grade level.





Tiger

Tiger is an exciting program for first grade Scouts (or those who are 7 years old) and their adult partners. Tiger Scouts complete six adventures and one elective displayed on their belt.

Wolf

A Cub Scout who has completed first grade (or is age 8), works on six adventures and one elective to earn the Wolf rank.

R

A Cub Scout who has completed second grade (or is age 9), works to complete six adventures and one elective to earn their Bear rank.

Webelos

When a Cub Scout has completed the third grade (or becomes 10 years old), they join a Webelos den. The Scout works on requirements for the Webelos badge, five adventures, one elective and in the second year, the Arrow of Light Rank (the highest rank in Cub Scouting.) Consisting of four adventures and one elective.





Camping and outdoor programs are an important part of the Arrow of Light program. Between February and April of a Arrow of Light Scout's 5th grade year, they graduate from Cub Scouting into the adventure of Scouts, BSA at an impressive graduation ceremony.

Your Child, Scouting, and You

As a parent, you want your child to grow up to be a person of character, a participating citizen, self-reliant, and a caring individual. Scouting has these same goals in mind. Scouting weaves lifetime values into fun and educational activities designed to assist parents in strengthening character, good citizenship and personal fitness in youth.

Scouting's values are family values. However, Cub Scout age youth do not join Scouting just to build character. They join because it is fun!

Programs

Lion Program | Kindergarten

- The Lion Program is designed to introduce Kindergarten-aged youth and their families to the fun of Scouting.
- Each family is a member of a Lion Den.
- A Lion Den has an experienced Cub Scout Leader called the Lion Guide.
- A Den has six to eight Lions and Adult Partners.
- A Den meets for eight to nine months of the year, two times per month; once for a Den meeting and once for an outing or Pack meeting.
- Each Adult Partner will take turns leading a Den meeting, with the Lion Guide's assistance.

Tiger Program | First Grade

- Each family is a member of a Tiger Den.
- A Den has a Den Leader and an Assistant.
- A Den has three to eight families.
- Dens meet once a week, regularly scheduled at the leader's convenience, and attend the monthly Pack meeting.
- Meetings are based on the adventures and electives taken from the Tiger Book, and are scheduled by the host Den Leader.

Cub Scout Program | Second through Fifth Grade

- Your Scout is a member of a Den.
- Each Den has four to eight Scouts.
- Dens meet once a week, regularly scheduled at the leader's convenience, and attend the monthly Pack meeting.
- Led by a Den Leader (Is a parent/volunteer).
- The Den Leader is assisted by an Assistant Den Leader and often a Den Chief (an older Scouts BSA member).
- Den meetings have games, songs, ceremonies and periodic field trips.

An exciting summertime week long activity that includes crafts, games, nature, sports, songs and skits. Day Camps are held in each District at various locations around the Council.

Family Adventure Camp

June

A fun filled three days and two nights of camping just for Cub Scouts and Webelos. Scouts and their Leaders will participate in age-appropriate activities held at Babbitt Cub World at Zink Scout Ranch.



Pack Organization

Your Scout is a member of a Pack


- Packs are made up of one or more Dens.
- Packs meet once a month. All Cub Scout families are expected to participate.
- Pack meetings are led by the Cubmaster.
- Pack meetings are the climax of the month's Den meeting and activities.
- Pack meetings have games, skits, stunts, songs, ceremonies and presentation of badges that the Scouts earned that month.

The Pack is run by the Pack Committee

- Includes all interested parents.
- Meets once a month (or more often if needed.)
- Led by a Committee Chairman
- Committee provides leadership, finds meeting places, performs record keeping, manages Pack finances, orders badges, maintains Pack equipment, helps train leaders, recognizes leaders and organizes field trips.

The Pack is owned by a Chartered Organization

- Chartered Organizations include parent-school organizations, religious institutions, service clubs and other organizations interested in youth.
- Chartered Organizations approve leadership, help secure a meeting place, keep the Pack within sponsor's and Boy Scout guidelines and policies.
- Chartered Organizations select a Chartered Organization Representative (a liaison between your Pack and your sponsor.)



Leadership Descriptions

Cubmaster

The Cubmaster's main responsibilities are to:

- Work directly with the pack trainer, Tiger Cub den leaders, Cub Scout den leaders, Webelos den leaders, den chiefs, and pack committee chair and members to make sure that all dens are functioning well.
- Plan the den and pack programs with the help of other leaders.
- Lead the monthly pack meeting with the help of others. Involve all dens in some way.
- Coordinate the total Cub Scout program in the pack.

Pack Committee Chair

The Pack Committee Chair's responsibilities are to:

- Report to the chartered organization to cultivate harmonious relations.
- Confer with the Cubmaster on policy matters relating to Cub Scouting and the chartered organization.
- Supervise pack committee operation by calling and presiding at pack leaders' meetings.
- Conduct the annual pack program planning conference and pack leaders' meetings.
- Maintain adequate pack records and take care of pack property.
- If the Cubmaster is unable to serve, assume active direction of the pack until a successor is recruited and registered.

Tiger/Wolf/Bear/Webelos Den Leader

The Den Leader's responsibilities are to:

- Give leadership in carrying out the pack program in the den.
- Lead the den in its participation at pack meetings.
- Work in harmony with other den and pack leaders.
- Maintain a friendly relationship with the Tiger Cubs and their adult partners.
- Stimulate the Cubs' imaginations on the program theme for the month, and work with the adult partners to prepare boys for participation in pack meetings.
- Develop and maintain a good working relationship and open communication with den families. Use their talents to help enrich the den program. Hold den adults' meetings as often as needed to get acquainted with family members and strengthen den operation.
- See that a leader is available for all den meetings and activities. Call on the assistant den leader to fill in when necessary.
- Take part in the annual pack program planning conference and pack leaders' meetings.

Youth Protection Training for Leaders

So, You're A New Leader?

Congratulations, and thanks for volunteering to make a difference in the lives of some really great Scouts. The Boy Scouts of America has some really great training. To begin, you will need to take Youth Protection Training. To take online training you will need to create your MyScouting account.

To create your MyScouting account, go to my.scouting.org and watch the account creation demo.

Once you have established your MyScouting account, you can log in. Go to Training on the menu on your left, click on E-Learning, then click on the Cub Scout tab to find Youth Protection Training. Scroll down to find additional courses.

The training continuum for Cub Scout Leaders includes: Youth Protection training and Leader Position Specific training.

A trained leader is better qualified to run a quality, fun-filled program. Leaders who understand the why's and how's of the program are more effective in their roles. They know how to use available resources to provide an exciting and worthwhile program for Scouts.
